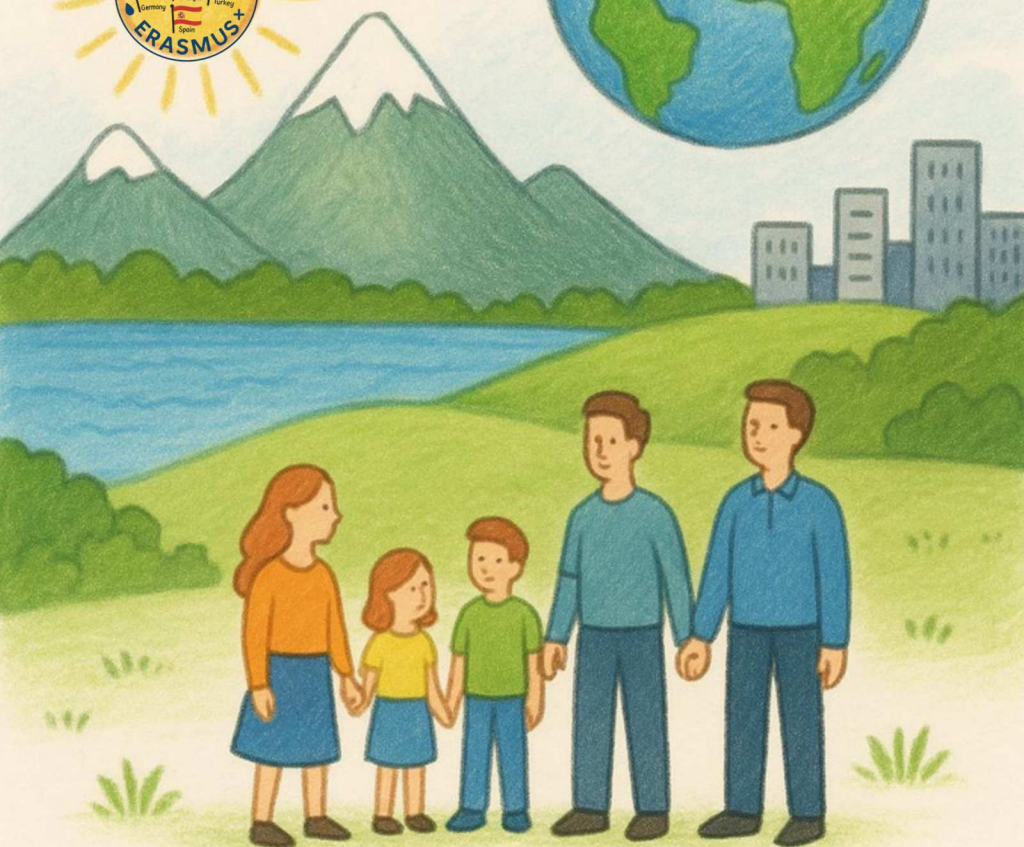

- Some plants and animals to disappear

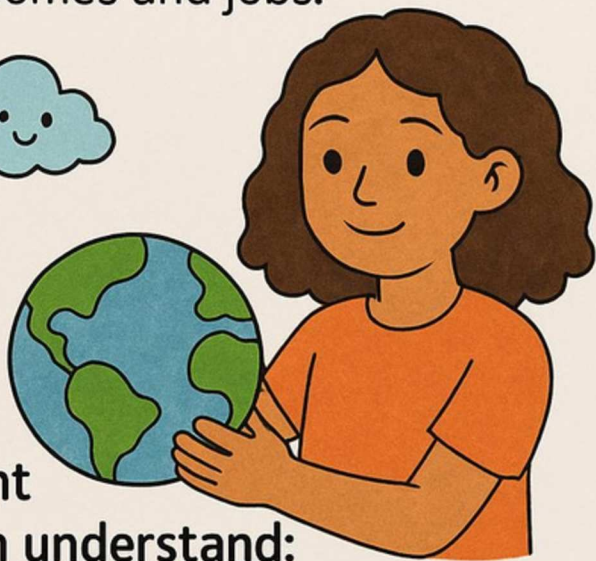


Youngsters may not really comprehend climate change, despite hearing about it frequently. With hope and action in mind, we teach it through natural observation, basic models, and actual data.

to help them understand:**

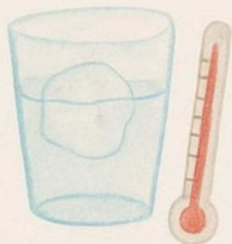
- What's happening

# WHAT WE DO AT SCHOOL

In our climate education program, students:

- Conduct simple experiments (e.g. melting ice, measuring temperature)



- Build models (e.g. green cities, solar ovens)



- Paint and write about their “green dreams”



- Learn about climate heroes and local actions



Everything is age-appropriate and designed to support their natural curiosity.



# WHAT YOU CAN DO AT HOME

You don't need to be a scientist to support your child! Here are some ideas:

- Talk positively about nature and solutions
- Grow a small plant together
- Watch a documentary and discuss it
- Turn off lights and devices when not in use
- Let your child draw a poster about protecting the planet
